

### COMMUNITY OUTREACH WITH INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS



In Addition to the event with Tamarack, I chose to interview International students who serve as Community leaders on Canadian University Campuses



#### Simran Aman

President of the Bangladeshi Students Association, Simran shared her experience as an international student looking for Community in Canada.

She also described how she found community in friends who share her language and culture on campus. She maintained that government policies towards helping International students find community need to improve

Shanzeh Faisal: A leader of Pakistani student's Association at U of T, Shanzeh expressed the difficulties International students face in finding community, due to lack of cultural and linguistic similarities

Speaking to international students, it was evident that leaving behind your culture and home to start a new life is very difficult and without a strong community can be isolating



My CEI helped me understand that *immigrants and international students* are most vulnerable to social isolation and should be included in Community Development practices
